# Psalm 34

#### Introduction

**Goodness** by Paul David Tripp

I have one place of confidence, one place of rest and peace and hope. I have one place of surety, where courage can be found and strength waits for the taking. I have one place of wisdom where foolishness wanes and truth grants freedom. Alone I am not confident, no pride in strength or knowledge or character. I know who I am, the duplicity of my heart, the weakness of resolve, the covert disloyalty that makes me susceptible to temptation's hook. I have one place of confidence, it isn't a theology a book a set of principles a well-researched observation a worldview. No, my confidence is in You. You are my hope because You are Good. I rest in the goodness of your sovereignty,

power,

in the goodness of your

faithfulness,

in the goodness of your

wisdom,

in the goodness of your

patience,

in the goodness of your

mercy,

in the goodness of your

holiness,

I have learned

# The Most Glorious Thing About God

Though it is not part of Psalm 34, I wanted to begin here in Exodus 33:19:

"The LORD replied, 'I will make all my **goodness** pass before you, and I will call out my name, Yahweh, before you. For I will show mercy to anyone I choose, and I will show compassion to anyone I choose.""

One day Moses was talking with God, and he said, "Show me your glory." It was a remarkable moment in human history. Have you ever asked God for that? "Show me your glory." How do you think God would respond? If you were God, what would you show Moses? Would you show him thunder and lightning, a tremendous earthquake, huge galaxies, or special effects? The Lord said, "I will cause all my goodness to pass in front of you." In other words, the most glorious thing about God is not his power, majesty, strength; the most glorious thing about God is how good he is. God passed by Moses and proclaimed his goodness, kindness, love, mercy, and compassion. That was God's glory. (John Ortberg)

In comparison to God's glorious goodness, we humans pale. While we are made in God's image and have the potential for goodness, in our current state we need God's unfailing love and mercy to transform us into goodness.

So to begin with today, we affirm, God alone is good. Any goodness in us or coming from us flows from God, the Source of all goodness!

# God's Goodness Is Everything We Need for Life

God's goodness embraces everything that is beneficial for life, pleasing to life, and harmonious with life. As we experience the Lord's provisions for life, we see that the Lord is good. We are, though, prone to take that for granted. We are surrounded by God's goodness; we are saturated with God's goodness. And yet, we so often are blind to it...especially in our everyday lives. I read this intriguing piece from Dan Meyer on how we experience God's goodness everyday:

But I got up this morning and gravity worked perfectly again. From the look of everybody I passed on the way to church, the miracle of cellular life was still operating quite remarkably. The sun was still just the right distance from this earth to keep me from freezing or frying. Throughout this morning, I've been able to enjoy all kinds of experiences that theologians call common graces, the simple gifts that come with being made a human being. I could taste coffee, smell perfume, hear music, see beauty, feel the touch of warm hands. And just think what opportunities to love, laugh, and learn—or to share with those who have less of these gifts—await me and you this afternoon.

We are invited to taste and see that the Lord is good! What an invitation! And our experience of these things, move us to ponder then embrace that God is good! Consider this:

That God provides all we need...God will supply for us every good thing that we need to be what he's called us to be and to do what he's called us to do in the place where he's put us. Peter puts a spotlight on that in 2 Peter 1:3-4 (NLT):

"By his divine power, God has given us everything we need for living a godly life. We have received all of this by coming to know him, the one who called us to himself by means of his marvelous glory and excellence. And because of his glory and excellence, he has given us great and precious promises."

By way of contrast, note as well what God will **not** do. God never toys with us. God never is foolish in the way he dispenses his gifts. God never plays favorites. God never mocks our neediness. God never plays bait and switch. God never teases or toys with us. God's timing is always right and the gifts that he gives are always appropriate to the moment. God is kind, faithful, loving, merciful, and good.

God in His goodness will not relent, will not quit, will not rest until ever promise he has made been fully delivered. God in his goodness will not turn from his work until every one of his children has been totally transformed. God in his goodness will not turn away when we call upon him in anxious cry for help. God in his goodness will not stop until his mission in and through us is complete!

As Paul David Tripp reminds us, "God will continue to fight until the last enemy is under his feet. As long as sin exists, he will shower us with forgiving, empowering, and delivering grace. He will defend us against attack and attack the enemy on our behalf. He will be faithful to convict, rebuke, encourage, and comfort. He will continue to open the warehouse of his wisdom and unfold for us the glorious mysteries of his truth. He will stand with us through the darkness and the light. He will guide us on a path we could never have discovered or would never have been wise enough to choose."

Wow! Isn't that encouraging! Just imagine where we'd be without God's goodness!

# Is God Still Good When Our Lives Are Not?

Jesus said, "...in this world, you will have trouble." (John 16:33) Yes, trouble happens...in your life and mine. My question, and I believe it is a question we all wrestle with in some way or another, is this: "Is God still good, when our life isn't?" When trouble comes and we experience bad things in our lives, is this proof that God isn't good?

Even though trouble comes, God prevails over the trouble. Look at the life of Joseph in the OT. He encountered all kinds of evil in his life, but God wove it into good. God prevails over evil. We do, however, most definitely need a *long view* of those circumstances. If you fixate on the specific circumstances of one slice of life, it could likely appear as if God is not good all the time. But when you

take the long view and look with discerning eyes to see how God weaves those bad things into good things, we see a far different picture.

**Christine Caine** is walking proof of this promise. She is an Australian spark plug. Five feet three inches of energy, passion, and love. To sit down with Christine is to share a meal with a modern-day Joseph. She is at war with one of the greatest calamities of our generation: sex slavery. She travels three hundred days a year. She meets with cabinets, presidents, and parliaments.

Pretty impressive for a girl whose world was turned upside down. At the age of thirty she stumbled upon the stunning news of her adoption. The couple who raised her never intended for her to know. When Christine happened upon the truth, she tracked down her biological parents.

The official records of her birth told her this much: she was born to a Greek mother named Panagiota. The box designated "Father's Name" bore the word "Unknown." But there was more. Next to the box marked "Child's Name" was another seven-letter word. It sucked the air out of Christine. "Unnamed."

Abandoned by those who conceived and bore you. Could anything be worse? Actually, yes. To be sexually abused by members of your family. Time and time again they took advantage of her.

Yet what they intended for evil, God used for good. Christine laid hold of Isaiah 49: "The Lord has called Me from the womb; from the matrix of My mother He has made mention of My name" (v. 1).

Years later when she heard of the plight of girls caught in the sex trade, she knew she had to respond. When she saw their faces on missing-person posters and heard of the abuse at the hands of captors, this unnamed, abused girl set out to rescue the nameless and abused girls of her day. Satan's plan to destroy her actually emboldened her resolve to help others. Her A21 Mission has offices around the world. And as of the writing of these words, several hundred young women have been assisted and released.

If you looked at one slice of Christine's life, you could easily assume that it was proof that God cannot be good...at least not all the time. And if he's not good all the time, is he really good at all? But seeing her life from the long view, you can see so much more. You can see God's artistry of taking dark, tragic circumstances and weave them into something beautiful!

# God's goodness is not an escape from pain and suffering but a refuge of strength in the midst of it.

Pretending like our lives our immune from the difficult things in life is an obvious form of denial. God's goodness, however, leads us toward reality not away from it. So, instead of being an escape from the pain and suffering that all humans encounter at some point along their life journey, God's goodness is a refuge in the midst of it.

Listen to the many ways this remarkable Psalm reveals this:

I prayed to the Lord, and he answered me. He freed me from all my fears. Those who look to him for help will be radiant with joy; no shadow of shame will darken their faces. In my desperation I prayed, and the Lord listened; he saved me from all my troubles. For the angel of the Lord is a guard; he surrounds and defends all who fear him. (34:4-7)

The Lord hears his people when they call to him for help. He rescues them from all their troubles. The Lord is close to the brokenhearted; he rescues those whose spirits are crushed. The righteous person faces many troubles, but the Lord comes to the rescue each time. For the Lord protects the bones of the righteous; not one of them is broken! (34:17-20)

"Taste and see that the Lord is good. Oh, the joys of those who take refuge in him!"

James Bryan Smith and his wife Meghan found that refuge in a tough spot in their lives... they had their world's rocked when doctors told that the little girl Meghan had been carrying for eight months had a rare chromosomal disorder that would likely cause her to die at birth. They went home completely disoriented and full of tears. The doctors were so matter-of-fact in announcing this bad news that James wanted to grab them and shake them and say, "This is our daughter you're talking about, not some medical malfunction!" This was the toughest test they had yet faced. Now they were staring down the coming death of a child. How does a person survive this kind of news? Take refuge in God's presence!

It turned out the doctor's prognosis was wrong. She did have a chromosomal disorder, but not one that was immediately fatal. Their little *Madeline* (ironically, her name means "tower of strength") survived birth but weighed only a few pounds, had a heart defect, was deaf, and could not keep food down. The medical experts then told them that she would not live more than a year or two.

During this time both James and Meghan felt as if they had been kicked in the stomach—over and again. It just would not end. Madeline lived for just over two years and then her little body finally gave up the fight.

A few years later after Madeline died, when James was in the middle of a day of solitude. His mind went over the last few years, thinking about the pain of hearing the news from the doctor, the countless sleepless nights on hospital floors, and the dark and rainy day we placed her body in the earth. He turned to God and said, "Maybe it would have been better if she had never been born."

That was when James received one of the clearest experiences of God responding to him that he'd ever had in his life. On this day, at that moment, a little voice penetrated my mind, the voice of a little girl, a voice he had never heard but immediately recognized as Madeline's. "Daddy, you should never say that. If I had never been born, I would not be here now. I am so happy here in heaven, and one day you and Mom and Jacob (their son) will come and see me, and we will live forever together. And,

Daddy, there is more good that has happened because of me that you can't see now but will one day understand."

He immediately repented of those thoughts…ever so thankful to hear her voice. Another narrative entered his mind—the story about the promise of heaven. James was beginning to see how a person could face tragedy and still say, "God is good to me." To understand how Job could say, "Though he slay me, yet will I trust him." (Job 13:15)

Then he found another narrative welling up in his mind, how the Lord had been a refuge through that long journey. Trusting the Lord through the thick of it was indeed their lifeline.

Two years after Madeline's death Meghan became pregnant. For eight months they lived with a lot of anxiety, mixed with a little faith. When it came time to have that final sonogram, their hearts were in their throats, bracing for whatever news came their way. The technician, who did not know their story, kept saying things we loved to hear: "Perfect hand, perfect heart, your baby looks perfect. Do you want to know the gender?" "Yes!" "It's a little girl. What are you going to name her?" At the very same moment both James and Meghan said, "Hope."

#### **Conclusion**

In this world we will have trouble, Jesus tells us. That doesn't mean God is not good. Take the long view to discover God's goodness even through the most difficult experiences of life. What would be different in your life if you took refuge in the Lord in times of trouble? What's one thing you could do this week to take that *taste test for the soul and experience the Lord's goodness* more than ever before in your life?

How about this: **put your mind on the goodness of God!** We have the tendency to put our minds on our problems, our troubles, our weaknesses, our inabilities, our failures. When we do that our faith grows weaker by the minute. What if with the help of the Holy Spirit we shift our focus to the goodness of God? That's what the apostle Paul implored us to do:

"And now, dear brothers and sisters, one final thing. Fix your thoughts on what is true, and honorable, and right, and pure, and lovely, and admirable. Think about things that are excellent and worthy of praise." Philippians 4:8 (NLT)

As a result, we grow stronger and as well this: joy! "Taste and see that the Lord is good. Oh, the joys of those who take refuge in him!"
