Psalm 27:14

“Wait patiently for the LORD. Be brave and courageous. Yes, wait patiently for the LORD.” (NLT) “Stay with GOD! Take heart. Don’t quit. I’ll say it again: Stay with GOD.” (MSG)

Introduction

There is another pandemic raging across our world: ***the pandemic of people losing heart!*** People are weary with contending against a now two-year pandemic. People are losing heart struggling against the new realities this pandemic has created. People are losing heart just dealing with life challenges in this new environment that makes everything else harder. People are losing heart in the face of mounting calamities: hurricanes, flooding, wildfires, earthquakes, gun violence, racial tensions, etc.

What causes a person to lose heart? What makes a person want to give up? Why do we entertain fantasies about running away? ***We lose heart because we tie our hope to the wrong things.*** Your motivation to continue is only as strong as what you have placed your hope in. Perhaps that is why we so easily lose heart in the face of obstacles, opposition, or difficulty. We have placed our hope and our security in the wrong things.

Well, David has a clear and strong word for us in this new reality. *“Stay with GOD! Take heart. Don’t quit. I’ll say it again: Stay with GOD.”* Psalm 27:14 (MSG)

Stay With God!...Wait patiently for the Lord

Let’s be honest. We hate to wait. We won’t like long lines or delayed appointments. We don’t like obstacles in our way. In our culture, we don’t do waiting well.

But, it’s not just the inconvenience of waiting, but the soul-ramifications of waiting...it signals that we are not in control...that we are not in the center of our universe like we thought we were!

Some people get so uneasy about the not being in control, so they choose not to stay with God. They strike out on their own just to preserve some semblance of control, only to discover that leads them into more and more situations that lead into danger. They soon discover that they have lost their way altogether.

So why wait? In waiting, we humbly acknowledge that our lives don’t belong to us, that my life does not belong to me. When we wait humbly, we fall on our knees and open our hands and give our lives back to our Lord. Lord, do what you know is best with me and I will follow. I trust Your wisdom and Your grace.

One other thing about waiting. Spiritually speaking, in the kingdom realm, Paul David Tripp says that, *“Waiting is not about the suspension of meaning or purpose. It is part of the meaning and purpose God has brought into our lives. Waiting on God isn’t to be viewed as an obstruction in the way of the plan. Waiting is an essential part of the plan. **Waiting is primarily about what we become as we wait!**”*

Waiting restores us. Waiting heals us. Waiting shapes us. Waiting prepares us.

On our way back from our anniversary getaway, we came across a pottery store with a working potter in the northern Indiana town of Goshen. It was mesmerizing to stand there and watch him at work with nimble and skilled fingers. He applied pressure on the clay right where it was needed so that lump of clay would take on the beauty that resided within it as potential.

Next time you are asked to wait, think about that scene. The Master Potter skillfully, intricately working on your lump of clay with just the right amount of pressure here or there to produce beauty in your life. What an image!

Take Heart...*Be brave and courageous.*

“This is my command—be strong and courageous! Do not be afraid or discouraged. For the Lord your God is with you wherever you go.” Joshua 1:9 (NLT)

These same words are used in several dynamic situations in the OT: This is how Moses exhorted Joshua before leading Israel into battle (Deut. 31:7,23 and Joshua 1:6,7,9,18). David used these words when strengthening Solomon to assume leadership in the kingdom (1 Chronicles 22:13; 28:20). King Hezekiah exhorted his military officers when Sennacherib besieged Jerusalem (2 Chronicles 32:7). These are words of preparation for action in the face of difficult threats.

Paul David Tripp shares, however, that the *“take heart”* of Psalm 27 is different than most *“take hearts”* which are attempts to change our feelings about some present difficulty or disappointment. Here it is a call to wait upon the Lord. It is an invitation to rest in the one place where rest can truly be found—in the Lord.

Who is the One in whom we can take heart? He is the definition of love...God is love. God is the essence, the source. He is the source of all wisdom. He is the source of awesome power. This is a God of unchallenged rule. He is a God of glorious grace. When we do the hard work of waiting, we are establishing the lifeline connection to the Source of love, wisdom, power, and grace. God can then infuse our hearts with a courage we didn’t perhaps even know was there! *Where do need this enduring strength right now in your life?*

- Shrouded with grief after the passing of a loved one?
- Watching a loved one struggle mightily with cancer?
- Contending with unimaginable pain?
- Struggling to make ends meet with more bills than funds?

- Agonizing over your son or daughter's choices?
- Wrestling with a dream that is struggling to come to life?

You need a divine dose of Colossians 1:11!

*We pray that you'll have the **strength to stick it out over the long haul**—not the grim strength of gritting your teeth but the **glory-strength God gives**. It is strength that endures the unendurable and spills over into joy, thanking the Father who makes us strong enough to take part in everything bright and beautiful that he has for us."*

Don't Quit...*Yes, wait patiently for the LORD*

Facing the Giants is about a Christian high school football team and their coach, **Grant Taylor** (Alex Kendrick). In six years of coaching, Grant has never had a winning season. After realigning himself with God, Grant delivers his team a new philosophy. But he will need the leadership of one of his key seniors, **Brock Kelly** (Jason McLeod).

As the players are gathered for practice, one of them asks, *"So coach, how strong is Westview this year?"*

Brock answers, *"A lot stronger than we are."*

The coach asks, *"You already written Friday night down as a loss, Brock?"*

"Well, not if I knew we could beat 'em," Brock responds.

The coach says, *"Come here, Brock. You too, Jeremy."*

"What? Am I in trouble now?" asks Brock.

"Not yet," answers the coach. *"I want to see you do the death crawl again [a training exercise where Brock will crawl with a player on his back, without his knees touching the ground], except I want to see your absolute best."*

"What, you want me to go to the 30?" asks Brock.

"I think you can go to the 50."

"The 50? I can go to the 50 if nobody's on my back."

"I think you can do it with Jeremy on your back, but even if you can't, I want you to promise you're going to do your best."

"All right," Brock answers.

"One more thing," Coach Taylor adds. *"I want you to do it blindfolded."*

"Why?"

"Cause I don't want you giving up at a certain point when you could go further."

As Brock takes his position and Jeremy climbs on his back, the coach calls out: *"All right, Brock, let's go. Keep your knees off the ground. Just your hands and feet. There you go, just a little bit left. Show me good effort. That a way, Brock, you keep comin'. There you go, it's a good start."*

Brock then asks, *"Am I at the 20 yet?"*

"Forget the 20. You give me your best. Now, don't stop, Brock. You've got more in you than that."

As Brock slows to a stop, he utters, *"I'm not done, I'm just restin' a second."*

The coach continues to yell encouragement until Brock cries out, *"It hurts!"*

"Don't quit on me," the coach answers, *"your very best—keep drivin'."*

"He's heavy," Brock wheezes.

"I know he's heavy."

"I'm about out of strength."

"Then you negotiate with your body to find more strength," Taylor yells, raising his volume to exhort his player, *"but don't you give up on me, Brock. You're doin' good. Do not quit on me. It's all heart from here."*

By now the entire team is standing speechless, watching Brock continue on. The coach shouts: *"30 more steps...20 more...10 more...1 more,"* until Brock finally collapses. *"It's got to be the 50,"* Brock cries. *"It's got to be the 50; I don't have any more."*

"Look, Brock," says the coach, ***"you're in the end zone."***

Yes, sometimes waiting is hard work. What we become is the true payoff for this work of waiting. Brock grew up into a man during that 100-yards of excruciating waiting!

Conclusion

Christians behind the Iron Curtain in Ukraine and Serbia recently celebrated their Christmas. I was touched when I read a little article about Christmas Day in Sarejevo. The awful warfare was all around them, despite promise after promise of a cease-fire. The airport was closed. More than a dozen civilians had already been killed when the article was written. Shelling the residential sections of the city, the Serbian army, just to break morale, caused havoc on Christmas Day. One reporter was downtown when the horrid sounds of indiscriminate shelling died down. He said, "I suddenly was stopped in my tracks because from several directions, from several churches, I heard people singing Christmas carols." ***Friends, that's the spirit it's going to take in the future for Christianity in this broken nation. Trust in God and don't quit.***
